THE ONLY WAY TO GROW

THE SECRET TO PERSONAL GROWTH FROM COLOSSIANS

Like most of us, you probably want to 'grow as a person.' Be more disciplined. Make better use of your time. Have better relationships. Get better at your job. Worry less. Cook more and increase your culinary skills. Take more control of the house and garden. Understand more about the world around us. Have more wisdom for living life well.

This desire for "growth" has spawned a whole industry of self-help books, documentaries and websites. It explains the massive interest in people like psychologist Jordan Peterson and organisation/tidying up consultant Marie Kondo. It also explains why many people come to Jesus. Because Jesus died for our sins and rose to give us new life, he offers the power to be freed from sinful habits and grow more and more like him.

The question is, once you've come to Jesus, how do you keep growing? Is it enough to just "trust and obey"? Or do you need to add something else? Maybe some more advanced Christian teaching, beyond the truths about Jesus? Or maybe there are some extra rules that you need? Maybe you should mix and match growth strategies from Jesus, Peterson and Kondo, getting the best of both worlds?

Paul wrote to the new Christians in the Greek city of Colossae because he wanted to share with them the secret of how to keep growing. We're fortunate that in this series, as we study that letter together, we'll find out what that secret is. We'll get to think through and discuss how we put it into practice in our lives, so that we can keep growing too. Let's pray that through this series God would teach us to keep growing as Christians throughout our whole lives.



FRIEND OF "SINNERS"

To see what Paul wants for the new Christians in Colossae, read Colossians 1:1-14.

1. The "gospel" is the good news about Jesus. The one who died for sin is king! What has this **gospel** been *doing* among the Colossians and throughout the world? (1:6, 10)

2. What's the *process* by which the gospel achieved this effect? (1:5-7) What concrete actions were needed?

3. What powered this process to make it effective? (1:9) Why was that power needed?

4.	With that good start in mind, what's the thrust of Paul's prayer for the Colossians? Trace his

5. Consider the following statements:

"Once you've believed in Jesus, God accepts you just as you are. You don't need to keep growing."

"A Christian needs to grow, and to do that they need more than the gospel. The gospel's a good start, but true growth relies on more advanced teaching and practices."

From Colossians 1:3-14, what do you think of these two statements? What truth do they contain and what error? How would you improve both statements?

FRIEND OF "SINNERS"

Paul thinks it's great that the Colossians have heard the gospel and believed it! He thanks God for that (1:3-4). This belief in Jesus has fully qualified them to be part of God's forgiven people (1:12-14). But the blessings of belief in Jesus don't end with forgiveness! The same gospel also produces growth. Growth in understanding of God and his will, which leads to a radically changed life (1:9-10). So it's actually not enough to believe the gospel and then forget about it. You have to keep trusting Jesus, so he keeps changing you (1:11). If this is Paul's prayer for the Colossians, we shouldn't be surprised to find it's also his goal for the letter overall...

Colossians is short, so read the rest of the letter together in your group (1:15-4:17). As you do, take note of any verses that repeat the key ideas you've seen at the beginning - verses about continued belief in Jesus and growth.

6.	is Paul's main point? Which particular verses seem to summarise that main point?
7.	Even if you're going well, like the Colossians were, growth is a lifelong journey. Looking back at Paul's prayer (question 4), in what areas do you still have more growing to do?
8.	What sort of things stop you expecting growth? (Are you at a stage of life where you expect to keep growing?) How should this letter adjust your expectations?

tho	eks, we'll go deep on how we can grow (and what stunts growth). One thing we've seen already ough is that <i>prayer</i> is essential. Spend some time praying for each other now. As Paul prayed the Colossians, pray for each other that God would:
	"fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives, so that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience,

and giving joyful thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of his holy people."
